Your Community Preschool and Childcare

The fall program has begun! Our 2024-25 school year by the numbers: 45 children, ages 3-5, are currently enrolled. 36 children attend full-time which can be from 7 am to 5 pm. Nine children attend preschoolonly which is from 8:30-12:00 on four or five days per week. Thirteen staff members are currently serving as teachers, assistant teachers, administrators and support staff. We also have 2 practicum students from Purdue Northwest, 1 practicum student from Ivy Tech and 1 intern from Hammond Area Career Center. A cleaning crew of 5 comes daily to make sure our education wing is ready for a new day.

Throughout our classrooms, children are engaged in purposeful play and small group activities with their teachers. At the beginning of a new school year, routines and class meetings establish a sense of safety and connection as children learn to thrive in a group. Many classes have taken time to learn, "All About Me" as we celebrate the uniqueness and value of each child. Each class explores the "Big Feelings" that children express and discuss many ways to address those feelings.

Paws for Peace visited our children with two sweet dogs and a variety of stuffed pups. Even the reluctant children warmed up to Milo and Lily for snuggles. Scooby snacks and lemonade were also a big hit. Thank you to Suzanne, Sherrill and Jackie for creating experiences for our children. We look forward to future opportunities to create connections between our church families and our preschool families.

Congratulations to Karianne, our Director! Karianne and Roy Padilla welcomed a beautiful baby boy on July 27. Karianne and baby Lincoln are enjoying time together. We look forward to Karianne's return when she is ready.

High Places

Solomon loved the Lord, walking in the statutes of his father David, except that he sacrificed and offered incense at the high places. 1 Kings 3:14

This passage from 1 Kings is from the lectionary text we read on August 18. There is a lot of fascinating history about the "high places" (called bahmot in Hebrew) that can be useful for us in our time.

There were 3 "denominations" of priests in ancient Israel: the Mushites who followed Moses, the Aaronides who followed Aaron, and the Zadokites who were followers of Zadok. Like all denominations, they had their similarities and differences, which led to quite a few disagreements.

The Aaronides and the Zadokites were centered in Jerusalem and insisted that the only proper place to worship was at the Temple in Jerusalem. The Mushites, however, were wandering priests who traveled from village to village. They would set up a local altar (a high place or bahmot) so the people could make their sacrifices locally.

In Exodus 20:24-25, God instructs Moses saying, "(24) You need make for me only an altar of earth and sacrifice on it your burnt offerings and your offerings of well-being, your sheep and your oxen; in every place where I cause my name to be remembered I will come to you and bless you. (25) But if you make for me an altar of stone, do not build it of hewn stones, for if you use a chisel upon it you profane it."

Solomon's Temple and altar were built of hewn (cut) stone and the Aaronides and Zadokites believed that God would only bless those who sacrificed in that one place. They had their reasons. One is that once an altar (bahmot) was constructed and the Mushite priests had moved on, a sacrifice to any god could be made there. Frequently, Canaanite gods were worshiped in these sites along with the God of Israel, which encouraged idolatry.

Additionally, monetary offerings were made along with the sacrifices, and this money would not come to Jerusalem if it was given in the towns and villages. The incentive for this practice wasn't mere greed on the part of the Aaronides and Zakokites, but was motivated by fear that invading armies could raid that gold for their own use.

In Josiah's reforms (2 Kings 22-23) the Mushites lost the argument, and the bahmot were torn down and worship became centered on the Temple in Jerusalem. When the Babylonians invaded, the Temple itself was destroyed and the people (and the gold) were carried into exile to Babylon. The argument between the Mushites and the Aaronides and Zadokites no longer mattered. Worship had to occur where the people were. Perhaps the Mushites won the argument after all?

For us, the questions are "Will God come to us and bless us?" wherever we worship or only if we worship in the "correct" place, and "Will we be the kind of priesthood that stays inside our own walls, or will we be the kind that takes our worship out into the wider world?"

Biblically, the Aaronides and Zadokites seemingly won the argument, and the Bible mostly reflects their vision. But the exile shows that God wants to be worshiped everywhere.

Had I been a priest in ancient Israel, and based my vision, I clearly would have been a Mushite! Every time we love a neighbor, we are making a sacrifice and an offering to God. May that happen everywhere we go and with everyone we meet as we build bahmot in every heart we encounter. I pray that perspective grows to be more important to us than a focus on which building our potential new church occupies.

First Church Extends Period for Second Mile Giving

We all know that money doesn't stretch as far as it used to. In fact, money doesn't actually stretch at all: go ahead and try it with a dollar bill! So, we are moving toward doing each Second Mile giving for a period of two months instead of one. Please continue to give monthly. After all, the idea is to be able to give each worthy organization more money to do God's work.

For September and October, Brianna's Hope will be our Second Mile giving recipient. Brianna's Hope is a faith-based addiction recovery ministry. This compassionate ministry began in 2014 after the death of 24-year-old Biranna DiBattiste, who was missing for weeks until her body was found--having died from a heroin overdose. While searching Brianna's room, her worried parents found a prayer she had written that expressed her hope that Jesus would help her out of her addiction. Brianna's United Methodist pastor, Randy Davis, with her parent's support, started Brianna's Hope to put Brianna's prayer into action by providing help for people struggling with addiction through faith-based recovery support groups.

Brianna's Hope has expanded to 42 chapters (including the Woodmar chapter) with over 900 active members. Because many people struggling with addiction lack insurance, an important part of the ministry of Brianna's Hope is to fund treatment for those who otherwise could not afford it. To date, more than 1,750 addicts have received treatment funded by donations to Brianna's Hope!

Within the embrace of a Christian-based ministry, more than 800 addicts have committed or recommitted their life to Jesus Christ through the ministry of Brianna's Hope.

Woodmar Chooses Brianna's Hope for Monthly Mission

Woodmar Missions, during September and October, will be for Brianna's Hope. A Better Life - Brianna's Hope is a participant-driven, faith-based and compassion-filled addiction support group that meets each Wednesday evening at Woodmar. FUMC Finance News

First Church's net income balance, as of July 31, was \$320,847, which includes proceeds from the sale of the Fran-Lin parsonage. A total of \$58,750 from that amount was reimbursed in August to First Church's Foundation for funds used to repair and renovate the parsonage for sale. This will be reflected in the September finance report. Additionally, \$50,000 from the parsonage sale will be placed in a restricted account to cover a housing allowance for a future pastor, if such an allowance is needed in the years ahead. The remainder of the sale proceeds will be held in a separate restricted account for uses to be designated by the Finance Committee in conjunction with the Trustees and pastor. This may include support for building/property expenses and expanded ministries connected with the creation of a new church, following the merger exploration now under way.

A current expense fund deficit continues to challenge First Church (-\$32,345 as of July 31). The Finance Committee has requested \$72,000 from the Foundation to offset the church's ongoing decline in giving as projected through year's end. As of July 31, the giving total for the year to date was \$89,646, which is \$32,172 behind contributions for the first seven months of 2023.

July ended with expenses over income of \$8,230. We received \$6,326 in offerings for the month. Year to Date we show expenses over income of \$9,666. Our cash in the bank now sits at \$29,798. If these losses continue, monies will deplete soon. There were no unusual expenses for the month. On a brighter note, Community Preschool ended July with income over expenses of \$13,437! Their fiscal year also ended in July; their Year to Date is a positive \$20,548. Excited to see what the new year brings.

New Bishop Appointed to Indiana Conference

At the North Central Jurisdictional Conference in July, Bishop Tracy S. Malone was assigned as the resident bishop for the Indiana Conference of the United Methodist Church, effective September 1. A service celebrating Bishop Malone's assignment will take place on Sunday, September 15, at 3:00 pm EDT at St Luke's UMC, 100 W 86th St, Indianapolis. Bishop Malone was elected to the episcopacy at the 2016 North Central Jurisdictional Conference and has served as the resident bishop of the East Ohio Conference for the past eight years.

She also is currently the president of the UMC Council of Bishops, president of the General Commission on the Status and Role of Women, and a member of the Board of Trustees of Africa University. She pastored several churches in the Northern Illinois Conference, represented that Conference at four General and Jurisdictional Conferences, served as a district superintendent, and was dean of the Cabinet of the Northern Illinois Conference.

Bishop Malone received a bachelor's degree from the North Central College in Naperville, Illinois; a master of divinity degree from Garrett-Evangelical Theological Seminary in Evanston, Illinois (where she was a classmate of our Conference Superintendent, Rev. Dr. Marti Lundy); and a doctorate of ministry from United Theological Seminary in Dayton, Ohio. Bishop Malone and her husband, Derrick, have two daughters.

The North Central Jurisdiction's Episcopacy Committee is responsible for assigning bishops. The committee includes two people from each annual conference. Rev. Dr. Aleze Fulbright and Chris Hancock represented the Indiana Conference on the committee.
